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F1 Student Visa: The Last Milestone

A good GRE score along with good academic performance can get you admissions to good schools and also scholarships, but it can't ensure your entry into US land.

The F1 student visa is the last step but probably the most important one to realize your dream to study in the USA.

Today I am going to give you a few tips on how to prepare for your F1 visa.

Step 1: Application (DS-160)

Once you receive your I-20 and you pay your SEVIS fees, you are good to go for F1 visa application i.e. for DS 160.

DS 160 form will ask you very basic questions on your:

- Personal details
- University where you are going to
- Who is funding you
- Your tentative travel plans
- Couple of contacts in India and in US

Fill up this form with correct details, be honest and brief. In the event you had earlier visa rejection, even if it happens to be a tourist visa, please make a mention.

Once the form is filled, check it once be-

fore you hit the submit button.

Step 2: Pay your visa fees and book a visa date

Once your DS 160 is filled in, pay your visa fee, which is 160\$. Once you pay the fees you can book your visa appointment along with you biometric registration.

Step 3: Preparing documents

Remember there are three types of documents to be verified:

Academic documents:

- All your transcripts starting from Std. X till your graduation
- Your i-20
- Your GRE and TOEFL score card

a. Visa documents

- DS-160 confirmation page
- Visa appointment confirmation page
- SEVIS fee payment receipt

b. Financial Documents

- Letter of support from the sponsor
- Proofs of financial support
- Caution about financial documentation - keep in mind that the financial doc-

uments should produce proof of funds sufficient to take care of your two years of education, out of which one year of funding that includes your tuition cost and living cost should be shown as liquid assets, and year two expense can be shown as immovable assets.

Step 4: Preparing for Visa interview.

You will get about 5-7 minutes to inter-

act with the Visa Officer and in that you will need to convince the VO that your intent to go to USA is primarily to get quality education and not migration and if you are able to prove this then you will need to prove that you have sufficient finances to take care of your 2 years of expenses.

The probable questions for the visa are:

- Which University are you going to?
- How many universities had you applied for?

- Why particularly this university?
- Who is funding you?
- What do your sponsors do?
- What are your plans after graduation?

Please be thorough with the facts about the university and how you are going to fund your education.

So the key to crack F1 visa is:

- Prepare all your documents perfectly.
- Study all about your university and the course and speak to your parents about the fund arrangements.

C. Lastly be very concise and crisp in answering the questions. If you don't understand a question, don't hesitate to ask again.

Always remember the Visa Office is not interviewing you to reject your visa but the VO has to ensure that you are the right candidate to enter the US land.

The Konark wheel in the NSS badge with 8 bars signifies the 24 hours of a day, reminding the wearer to be ready for the service of the nation round the clock. The inspiring motto of

NSS is "NOT ME BUT YOU." Extraordinary NSS volunteers are awarded with 'Indira Gandhi National Award' and 'SAARC Youth Award'.

The students of Vidyalankar Institute of Technology led by the Program Officer Prof. Pravin Garge and a team of dedicated teachers have successfully revived NSS in the campus and are emerging as a strong unit for community service. The NSS-VIT unit provided a helping hand for the 'Kerala Flood Victims' by organizing a donation drive on campus and transporting around 30-35 cartons of flood relief material to the flood affected areas in Kerala.

It is rightly said that you make a living by what you get and you get a life by what you give. The NSS students prepared around 3000 paper bags out of which around 500 were distributed during a street play on "Plastic Ban". This highlighted the importance of plastic

Highlighting the significance of road safety, 25 NSS-VIT volunteers were trained last year by the well-known 'United Ways Mumbai' who in turn will train 25 more students this year, thus making them certified trainers too. This is a small attempt towards making youth spread awareness of road safety.

NSS-VIT volunteers are enriching their personality while aiming at making a difference to social welfare through exposure to the various segments of society and community seg-



ments within the institution and the village that the Institute had adopted last year Kharivali (Thane District). Learning about Patents

Want to share your big idea with the world? Are you a person who has multiple ideas? Are you someone who moves with the world and gets inspired to build a solution for a problem you noticed?

This is the generation of innovations. In today's fast-growing and competitive world, an essential topic to learn about is Intellectual Property Rights and Patent Searching. Patenting is registering your invention with the government so that the technology can be leveraged safely i.e. by taking permission from the patent holder or by purchasing or renting it. VSIT students attended a SKEP (Skill & Knowledge Enhancement Program) Session held by IEEE-VSIT Student Branch, on August 25, 2018. The session was presided by Mr. Kiran Talele; he is Student Activities Chair and EXECOM Member, IEEE Bombay Section and Associate Professor, Electronics Engineering Department, SPIT and has eight patents registered at the Indian Patent office.

There are two types of properties-tangible and intangible, ideas are counted under the latter. For patenting, the type of Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) needs to be identified, whether it is a Trademark, Patent, Copyright, Industrial Design or Geographical Indication. There can also be multiple IPR in one product, for instance, the graphical design on a can of Coca-Cola would be registered as a trademark and the can's aesthetic structure would be registered under Industrial Design. Patenting



safeguards the ownership of an IP and if not patented, an IP becomes obsolete anyway after a certain number of years. But we need time to work on our ideas, don't we? Well, the good news is that one can file a patent even if the implementation of that idea hasn't begun, the process is called provisional patenting but it is necessary to submit another filing in the next twelve months from the date of filing.
